elcome to our first edition for 2022 and our 101st edition overall. As we enter this fifth year of publishing we look at what 2022 might bring.

This might be a dangerous thing to do in these uncertain times, but we hope that with a fair wind this will be a better, and guite special year. The reason we say this is that the country will be celebrating the Platinum Jubilee of our Queen, who becomes the first monarch to reign for 70 years on 6th February. Although Covid, in it's Omicron disguise, is currently rampant it seems that many people are learning to live with this virus and not everything is being cancelled quite so readily. It's extremely unwise to underestimate this pandemic, but we detect that people are generally attempting to get back to some normality where they can.

Of course vaccinations and particularly the use of free Lateral Flow tests, can help with this as you can test yourself before going out and ensure that at least you are not going to infect people around you.

So what is in store for this year?

The long weekend at the beginning of June will feature a range of events. An extra Bank Holiday on Thursday 2nd June, followed by the Spring Bank Holiday moved to Friday 3rd June will provide a four-day weekend when most of the Jubilee events will take place. St Ives Town Council are keen to mark this event in style and although nothing is confirmed yet, look out for their main events on Saturday 4th June. This should include parades by the Engineers Regiment and St Ives Army Cadets. Both have the freedom of the Town.

The Council have also said they hope to have a large party, possibly involving a picnic tea in The Broadway, similar to those held for the peace celebrations at the end of the First World War (see below). Other groups are planning various events during the weekend, which hopefully will be confirmed in the next few weeks. Meanwhile regular entertainment is continuing (see page 2) and events such as Picnic in The Park and Music On The Waits will be held again.

Consequences for not trusting the authorities

ver the past two weeks the Hunts Post has carried articles about drink spiking in St Ives. This weeks headline claims that people fear reporting drink spiking incidents, according to an action group 'Anti Spikers of St Ives' (ASSI).

The group was formed by Dan Sly after his daughter's drink was spiked at an event in the town before Christmas. Mr Sly organised a survey which 75 people completed, 74% of whom said they considered spiking to be a serious problem in St Ives. ASSI claim that 17 incidents have taken place, however Cambs Police, said they were only aware of 1 incident. 19 people claimed in the survey that they did not report an alleged drink spiking incident in 2021 due being 'fearful of not being believed' and 24 others said they were 'unable to recall' what actually happened.

'The squeaky wheel gets the oil'

Like any large organisation the police has finite resources, which it must use where they will be most effective. In general they will respond to issues that are deemed most important and if the public do not report things, as in drink spiking, it is unlikely to get any attention.

So it is up to all of us to report our concerns so we can 'oil the wheel' and this applies to every issue ranging from anti-social behaviour and parking to seeing someone acting suspiciously. The Riverporter contacted Cambs Police about drink spiking in St Ives. This is their response:

Is the force is doing anything to raise awareness of this crime in St Ives? Additional patrols continue this month.

How is the force encouraging people in St Ives to report any incidents?

We encourage people to report any concerns they have, no matter how small, to us so we can build up a picture of what is happening in a certain area and work to address this. Concerns can be reported online via web chat: https://bit.ly/3vsiYDw or by calling 101.

You have had one incident reported in St Ives, can you confirm if this was investigated thoroughly?

An investigation has been launched and enquiries continue, which includes checking CCTV in the area. Anyone with any information is asked to contact police via web chat: https://bit.ly/3vsiYDw or call 101, quoting investigation reference: 35/88896/21

The police have a lot of work to do to restore trust in their organisation but they cannot do that alone. They need the public's help on so many issues. We must do our bit by reporting incidents to them, no matter how small so that the police can make better decisions.

Shrink Your Waste Footprint in 2022

In 2020, Huntingdonshire residents sent over 29,000 tonnes of waste to the landfill. Much of this could have been directed elsewhere. Recycling, reusing and composting are the keys to cutting our waste footprint, according to #HuntsWasteBusters.

In 2019 the council found that over 70% of the contents could have avoided the landfill. Our blue bins can take a lot more items than you might expect and the council can make compost from our green bin waste. Many soft plastics can now be recycled at larger supermarkets. Our Household Waste Recycling Centres accept a range of materials from paint tins to small electricals. Terracycle schemes also offer local drop-off points to recycle a variety of items.

The most important change you can make in 2022 is to tackle your food waste. Keep a bucket or caddy near your kitchen bin so it's easy to collect your food scraps, kitchen roll and tea bags. Add this to your green bin with your garden waste.

Huntingdonshire is already leading the way on waste reduction. We achieved the 33rd highest recycling rate across all 317 English councils in 2019/20. Let's all make a New Year's resolution to shrink our waste footprint and help Huntingdonshire climb to #1!

The most common issues that respondents were the most concerned about were congestion (339), heavy traffic (269), and road safety (241). Fewer respondents, but still a significant number,

Overall, when asked, 90% of respondents strongly agreed or agreed with the need to reduce road traffic (cars, lorries, vans) and that there is a need to improve ease of bus and coach use. Respondents also agreed about re-allocating road space to walking and cycling infrastructure. Overall, respondents most favoured a bypass option with other sustainable/active travel

Crucifixion in Fenstanton a first?

Fenstanton High Street follows the approximate route of the Via Devana, which linked the Roman towns at Cambridge and Godmanchester. A previously unknown Roman settlement in Fenstanton was found to have five small cemeteries and in one was the remains of a man with a nail through his heel which is believed to be extremely rare evidence for an ancient crucifixion – the first in the UK.



Can Planning Dept learn from Refuse?

A letter in this week's Hunts Post compared the performance of HDC's Refuse and Planning departments. The writer, P. Ambrose stated that Planning could learn how to be more customer facing from the Refuse Department. The Riverporter is often told that HDCs Planning Dept. is the cause of delays, and considerable costs to developers and applicants. In the same Hunts Post edition HDC's Leader, St Ives Councillor, Ryan Fuller, extolled the virtues of HDC's parks and open spaces and its waste services which he claims is in the top 25% in the country. He states that this work on parks is not part of the Councils statutory work. It is undoubtedly good for our well being but is presumably done at local taxpayers expense. On the other hand the Planning Department, a statutory service which is vital for the economic vitality of Huntingdonshire, often fails to meet deadlines. Planning has a poor reputation nationally, but wouldn't it be good if HDC's Planning Department could become one of the better ones?
