Yarn Bombers reign supreme at Coronation Big ~~Lunch~~ Picnic



Sunday 7th May will see Market Hill, in the centre of St Ives, adorned with woolly royalty, care of Elaine Spence and the Star Crafters' team of Yarn Bombers. Centre piece of the event will be an 8 foot high crown standing in front of the Oliver Cromwell statue. Oliver may have his eyes shaded as he doesn't like festivities!

This is a free event for everyone to bring along a picnic and join in the fun. There will be tables and chairs for 300 people to sit at.

There will also be activities for children and games, including *Splat A Rat*, the *Hobby Horse Race Challenge* and a *Human Fruit Machine*.

Entertainment will include live music from Mark Burton on keyboard and Opera Babe, Karen England plus music from Christopher Schofield and the excellent 29th Funktion.

This will be a fun afternoon on a joyous occasion and with music ranging from Dolly Parton's *Jolene* and the Bee Gees *Staying Alive to Land of Hope and Glory* - we will literally see dancing in the street.

Star Crafters have created three Coronation blankets and will be holding a raffle for one of them.

A silent auction will be held for a second blanket and the third blanket will be on sale for £150 from Star Dancewear from 2nd May.

The funds raised will be split between Star Crafters and the Mayor's charities.

The proposed timetable for the day, which begins at midday is:

Midday - Music from Christopher Schofield, with a repertoire of over 200 songs. There is bound to be a number you can sing along to.

Stalls open which includes: Crown making for children, Splat the Rat game, Star Crafters stall and the Coronation Mug stall.

12.50pm - Welcome from The Mayor.

1pm - A chance to enjoy your picnic with a selection of tunes from the keyboard wizard Mark Burton.

1.50pm the first *Hobby Horse Race Challenge*. Races will be held throughout the afternoon in different categories. Children under 6, under 12 and under 18, plus men's, ladies, grandparents and prizes for winners!

2pm - Music from The 29th Funktion. Four talented young local musicians bound for stardom.

2.45pm - Poems for a coronation. Throughout the day local poets will be performing some of their work written just for this occasion.

3pm - Mark returns with Opera Babe, Karen England, for a special Coronation set of inspiring songs incl. *You'll Never Walk Alone* and *Land of Hope & Glory*.

3.45pm - *Hobby Horse Race Challenge* finals and prizes.

4pm - The 29th Funktion.

4.50pm - Closing remarks from The Mayor, Phil Pope.

Church Hall plans turned down

Plans to convert the Parish Hall at the bottom of Ramsey Road into a number of flats have been rejected by HDC's Development Management Committee at their meeting on the 17th April. The Parish Church claimed that the hall was no longer being used as a community facility and needed major repairs.



Conversion to flats would raise money to do work within the church to provide similar facilities and fund general repairs. The Town Council had supported the application, as there are alternative community facilities nearby. HDC Planning Officers raised concern about the loss of a community facility and had some issues with aspects of the design so recommended that the plans be refused. The Committee agreed and the plans were turned down. It is not known if the Parish Church will appeal against the decision or come up with a new scheme.

Envar application refused

Cambridgeshire County Council's (CCC) Planning Committee has voted 5-4 to reject the planning application by Envar to install new equipment including a new medical waste incinerator at the Woodhurst site just north of St Ives.

CCC Officers had written a 130+ page report on the application which responded to the many comments made by local parish councils and members of the public and had recommended that the application be approved subject to a number of conditions.

However after an epic meeting on the 19th April that ran from 10am to 5pm (with a few breaks), councillors voted to refuse the application for two reasons. The visual impact of the chimney and the impact to local health and wellbeing caused by the development would outweigh the benefits of co-locating the new plant on the site.

The objectors are delighted with the outcome, however their joy may be short lived if Envar decide to appeal and the application is reviewed by the Planning Inspectorate. HDC, who are responsible for the visual aspect of planning applications, did not object to the scheme and the UK Health Security Agency (formally Public Health England) did not object to the health aspects of the scheme noting that it was very unlikely to be of any significant risk to health.

This is not the absolute statement that local residents would want, but it is what a responsible statutory body would make, knowing that it is not possible to eliminate all risks. Only politicians make rash promises such as 'it will never happen again'. It was noted in the meeting that a Planning Inspector would likely reject such reasons.

The meeting also spent some time debating the need for the plant in the first place. This was the main objection made by St Ives Town Council quoting the CCC Waste and Minerals Strategy that it had enough capacity to deal with medical waste.

The CCC Officer's report on the application contained a lot of data on the amount of waste being produced in the area and it is odd that this was not provided before. The data came from CCC and was first seen in their report with no opportunity for anyone to comment. It does not appear to show that there is sufficient waste needed to feed the incinerator that requires 12,000 tonnes each year. Until the formal rejection letter is sent out, it is not clear to what extent that the lack of demand could be a reason for rejecting the application.

The Envar scheme is not totally dead and if they decide to appeal it will run on for many months. The Riverporter will keep you informed.

Djanogly stands down

Jonathan Djanogly, who had previously said he would fight on to be the Conservative candidate at the next general election, has decided to stand down. He was first elected as MP in 2001 as replacement for former PM John Major.



Commenting on his decision in the Hunts Post, Mr Djanogly said: 'It has been a great privilege to serve the residents of the Huntingdon constituency as their Member of Parliament over the last twenty-two years and, together, we have achieved a significant amount'. Whilst some of his supporters may agree with that statement, clearly not all local Tories do, as they voted 12 to 9 against selecting him for the new constituency.

His critics may find his statement baffling as it is difficult to list any of his achievements whilst the list of controversies is impressive. In 2009 there was the expenses scandal and in 2010 he hired private detectives to discover who had leaked his parliamentary expenses. In 2011 he was stripped of his role regulating Claims Management firms for not disclosing a conflict of interest and during the 2017 general election campaign, at a hustings, he was accused of ignoring a constituents correspondence on childcare for children with disabilities, which he denied, claiming the constituent was a Labour stooge.

More recently he backed water firms being allowed to dump sewage in our rivers and his wife Rebecca Silk lost an employment tribunal where the ex employee claimed she was treated like a slave. That controversy was said to be the last straw for some local Tories.

In 2019 he was ranked 645th out of 650 MPs for 'openness and responsiveness' by change.org. On the other hand he did speak kindly about his ex parliamentary aide, and Distict Council leader, Ryan Fuller, when Mr Fuller was defeated by Julie Kerr in last year's local elections.
