Use it or Lose it!

hat is the message from the management of St Ives Corn Exchange (CIC), which urgently needs to raise income to get through the next two months.

Although a community facility, the Corn Exchange is also a business and like every other business in St Ives it is suffering from the economic downturn

Following Brexit, the Pandemic, the energy crisis caused by the Ukraine war and the crashing of the economy, trading is very difficult for most businesses. However the Corn Exchange has also had the extra burden of having to close due to asbestos removal on the roof. According to the CIC, the Riverport Café was closed for six months for this work, meaning a loss of about £17,500 income. Issues with the air conditioning also exacerbated the problem and this was on top of the extra cost of energy, at £16,289 over the past 13 months. The shortfall is likely to be £50,000 this year. The CIC are looking into several

measures to put the finances back on track, including raising charges to users and writing to the owners, St Ives Town Council, requesting immediate help with a loan.

Opened in 1864 it was paid for by local businesses and used by corn merchants. It was also used for concerts and meetings and was eventually sold to St Ives Borough Council in 1947. Following Local Government reorganisation in 1974 it passed to St Ives Town Council.

It has always been at the heart of the community as early pictures show. The Editor recalls the Chamber of Commerce organising exhibitions for local businesses in the 1970s during the three days of the Michaelmas Fair. A really bustling event.

He also booked the hall for a Ceilidh to celebrate his silver wedding



anniversary in the 1990s, when the hall had been allowed to deteriorate and bookings were made with the 'caretaker' employed by the Council. At the start of this century, the building's future was in doubt as the Council was informed that it wasn't safe. The Council was split on what to do with it. A large group of Town councillors wanted to sell it, Wetherspoons was a potential buyer. A campaign to save it was launched and the building was not only saved but enhanced and is now an impressive community facility.

The Council handed the running of the building to the CIC and quite recently the finances were on course.

Emergency Meeting

The Town Council held an emergency meeting, behind closed doors, last week to discuss the request from the CIC and while it's deliberations are secret The Riverporter understands that although councillors considered it at some length they failed to come to any firm decision.

We understand the Council would like to see a Business Plan to show how the Corn Exchange will become financially viable for the long-term.

The Council would also like to be given a definite figure for a one-off loan, and a repayment schedule, all sensible requests to ensure a loan will do the trick. Sadly time is not on the CIC's side as we understand funds will be required before the end of June.

What you can do to help?

There is no doubt the the Corn Exchange is a really important facility in the town. It is used by lots of town groups and with so many shops closed the town centre would be even more depressed, should the Corn Exchange close. And lets face it it has the best toilets in town!

You can help by using the facilities, particularly the coffee bar and attending events or even offering to help as a volunteer.

You will also be able to make a donation when a Crowd Funding page has been set up.

There are some 'strange goings on' at HDC with seven councillors forming a new group called Cambs Independents. There are 52 seats in total. The coalition which was in control of the Council consisted of 15 HDC Independents, 12 Lib Dems, 4 Labour and 1 Green councillor.

Following this week's Council meeting the groups are now: 20 Tories, 11 Lib Dems, 9 HDC Independents, 7 Cambs Independents, 4 Labour and 1 Green.

The cllrs involved are: (above left to right) Stephen Ferguson, St Neots (Leader); Sally Howell, Yaxley (Dep Leader); Michael

Burke, St Ives: Martin Hassell, Lib Dem Buckden: Richard Slade, Ben Pitt and Dr Marcus Pickering, all from St Neots. The Riverporter spoke with Stephen Ferguson to find out why they had done this and was reassured that they would still continue to support the coalition. Cllr Ferguson said he wanted to 'Make a group which was welcoming to people [from all political persuasions]'. The 'Seven', in effect, hold the balance of power. They could work with the Tories to take control, although Cllr Ferguson ruled that out, but never-theless it will give the seven more 'clout' in general. Councillor Ferguson has a high profile, especially in St Neots where he is also a County Councillor and has been Mayor and he may stand in it's new Parliamentary seat, on 4th July. This could affect the result by splitting the vote four ways.

Subject: Where did the warblers go?

For years the top of Meadow Lane in St Ives has been a reliable place to hear warblersincluding nightingales. Standing on the pavement near the roundabout, it was possible to hear, and see, a wide range of birds in spring, and across the year. Walking along the road showed how important the trees and scrub were: summer and winter.

In late winter, a series of red crosses appeared on mature trees in an area controlled by St Ives Anglers. One day in early spring, it was obvious that the red crosses weren't a good sign. Almost all of the trees, and unmarked young ones, and the scrub, were cut down and removed, leaving just a thin hedge line flanking Meadow Lane. Beyond is a now a zeroed wasteland.

A previously muddy track to the water's edge has been hardcored. Without the former tree and scrub cover, there is a clear view of the sailing lake. That doesn't seem to have been appreciated by the birds. Single chiffchaffs, and a garden warbler are left along the hedge. Every other warbler normally there has gone, as the scrub and trees are no more.

There is no obvious planning permission application on the HDC planning website. So, what is going on? As for the birds? Nightingales haven't suddenly appeared nearby, nor are other warblers stacking up in the vicinity. It looks like a very non-green action by the anglers. Why is uncertain.

Anthony Browne, MP, is also doing the same with regard to the Astrea School in St Neots.


Free support if TV interference occurs
