# Westfield Junior School Seeks Community Support

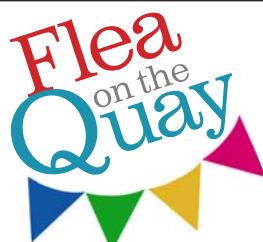


**Dear Millie,

Many people have asked me the same question and since the anticipated January reopening failed to take place a little sleuthing took place. I am pleased to share with you that Mountain Warehouse's move has finally been signed off so its refurbishment should soon be evident and, even better, Mountain Warehouse has agreed to sponsor the cost of conserving the carved beam as recommended by the conservators we commissioned last year.

A great result. The work will be done in situ so we can observe the work being done and, hopefully, be reassured. We will, of course keep a watchful eye on proceedings!

At around 12.46pm on March 16, a crew from Huntingdon were called to a house on fire at The Wilderness in St Ives, where they extinguished the flames. The fire had accidentally started in the outbuilding attached to the house.



### Eltisley Realignment may affect BI040

As part of the construction of the new dual carriageway between the Black Cat roundabout and Caxton Gibbet, changes are being made to the A428 at Eltisley. The B1040 north junction at St Ives Road will be removed, and two new roundabouts will be built. These roundabouts will be linked by a bridge that crosses over the new A421 dual carriageway. This work is likely to cause significant delays to travellers between St Ives and the A1 South of Biggleswade.



### New Town Councillor chosen

Laura Thompson (left), who moved to St Ives in 2021 has been chosen to take over the vacant seat on the Council. Her information on the Council website quotes Laura saying, 'A family-driven stay at home mum, I spend my evenings volunteering - I run both St Ives Rainbows and Brownies in the centre of town, and am actively involved in the PTA (FOTS) at Thorndown Primary School. I organised St Ives' first Baby Loss Awareness Week Memorial Ribbon Display and I also feel passionate that young people should be at the forefront of our minds, whether it's opportunities, facilities or sustainability, as they are the future.' She continued 'It is an honour to support a wonderful warm community that made St Ives become my home.'

### Do you listen to the news?

The traditional press and media outlets that we have relied upon for centuries are under pressure as the on-line world seems to be increasingly popular. Obviously as someone trying to keep our readers aware of the news I have to be in touch with both sources of information, for neither sources are totally complete. We hear that the young (20-30 year olds) prefer to get their news on Tik Tok or Instagram etc. and that is often unverified and can be untrue. I'm not sure the conventional news sources have always been totally truthful, although there are usually processes in place to ensure some verification of facts.

I find that often comments on-line, although sometimes unpleasant to the point of hateful, some humour can shine through and many people are happy to help their neighbours as they did during the Covid crisis as the following sample shows. Recently an enquiry on a St Ives site asked: 'Does anyone know of anyone locally who is Portuguese as I wish to learn the language?' The reply couldn't have been more helpful: 'I have a Spanish friend in Tewkesbury, will that do?' I was totally stunned the other day. Speaking to neighbours, a young couple (in their late 40s), they said they didn't have a television licence as they didn't have a TV or radio. They only watch programmes on Netflix and don't watch or listen to the news. I don't think they are unique. Will this generation turn away entirely from society? I know they seldom vote and don't seem to know or care who is in charge. It seems a very dangerous thing to do at this particular moment.

Some of my older friends are also not watching the news as often as they used to as it's so worrying. It seems a short leap from not listening to the news to being totally disengaged with society and letting the 'Mad Men' take over. Your vote counts ... more than ever. **Ed.**

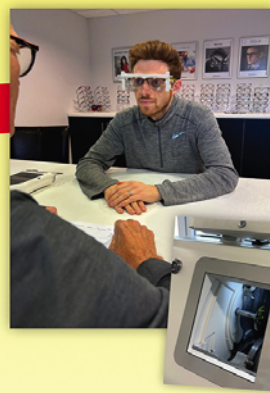
