ST IVES REMEMBERS

Next weekend the town will be celebrating the end of World War 1. Exactly 100 years ago the 'war to end all wars' came to a close and 37 million people had been killed or wounded. A golden age of prosperity had been brutally uprooted, leading to the bloodiest century in human history.

With this in mind, and because I'd been involved in the events to celebrate Jeffrey Day and wanted to know more about the impact the war had on St Ives, I decided to visit the exhibition at the Norris museum: **1918-2018 Huntingdonshire Remembers** on until 22 December. It is now 15 months since the Norris Museum re-opened after major refurbishment which updated the displays and added a community room. Attendance figures have been impressive, as have been many visitors comments. One comment, also repeated about other museums, is the feeling that the current drive to appeal to children often results in exhibits which are very touchy-feely, tend to make lots of noise and over simplify the subject.

Looking good

Presentation and displays look good, with modern printing techniques that seamlessly mix pictures and words. There is divided opinion about the current good practice, which suggests keeping the words to a minimum, not just for visual effect but because most people's attention span is short, we are told.

Another area created in the new development is a space where four exhibitions will be held over the year. At first glance this exhibition looks good and the displays are tastefully laid out. It featured several local people's stories, including that of Jeffrey and his brothers, Ivor who also died, and George who later became Town Clerk. Being the Museum of Huntingdonshire it featured people from further afield including, oddly, some from Bedfordshire and there were a few interesting artifacts,

including medals and a copy of Poems and Rhymes a, book of Jeffrey's poems published posthumously in 1919.

Lacking depth

However the exhibition lacked depth. The information on display had been distilled down to mainly headlines and the real story of the war seemed absent. Oddly the drive to attract younger people probably wouldn't result in enlightening them about the enormous effect that this war had on society, and Huntingdonshire in particular.

There was little to excite youngsters, who are unlikely to be interested in old medals but may be interested in trench warfare or the dangers faced by pilots who didn't have a parachute and shot at each other with rifles whilst 1,000 feet in the air and traveling at speed in a plane made of balsa wood, paper and canvas.

The exhibition didn't grip me and I doubt whether it would grip a 10 year-old. I feel it was a missed opportunity to let youngsters understand the significance of the conflict and how ordinary people from this area were affected. Surely an exhibition about this subject should be doing that at least.

The section of children's messages, organised by the British Legion, and the Remembrance Books, organised by the Civic Society, were more interesting.

Questions raised

I was left wondering why the exhibition was so lacklustre? Was it the result of a lack of time, or lack of resource or is it because lottery funding demands a certain style of presentation these days? **Ed**

Of course the meetings will discuss salaries etc. which should be in private, but we have no idea about any of the conversations that the 9 councillors and Friends Committee members discuss each quarter.

2,000 purple crocuses mark worldwide campaign



St Ives in Bloom and the Rotary Club of St Ives, working together, have cleared an area of the verge by Waitrose on Station Road and planted it with purple crocuses to raise awareness for the Rotary Club's campaign to finally eradicate polio worldwide.

St Ives in Bloom has been gradually improving the area, and then on the morning of Tuesday 23rd October an enthusiastic group of volunteers from the Rotary Club (right) arrived with boxes containing 2,000 purple crocuses!

The purple crocus flower has become the symbol of the Rotary Club's 'End Polio Now' campaign. When a child receives their life saving polio drops on mass polio immunisation days in many countries their

little finger is painted with a purple dye so it is clear they have received their vaccine.

The worldwide campaign has been extremely successful, but everyone is at risk from this dreadful disease until it is completely wiped out. To finish the job over 2 billion doses of oral polio vaccine have to be administered each and every year in over 60 countries until the world is finally certified polio free.

Police internet warning

Notified through the St Ives neighbourhood watch scheme, police have advised that there has been a large number of extortion attempts via email. Cyber criminals are attempting to blackmail unsuspecting victims by claiming to have used the victims' password to install spying malware on the victims' computer. The criminals claim they've recorded videos of the victim watching adult material. What makes this scam so convincing is that the email usually includes a genuine password the victim has used for one of their online accounts. Police believe criminals obtain the passwords from data breaches. If you receive such an email - **DO NOT REPLY TO IT.** Change any password that it mentions and try to flag the incoming mail as spam. Report it via the police Action Fraud website.
