he popularity of Heritage Open Day and The Old Riverport Jazz & Blues Festival saw record crowds come to St Ives and despite the weather being a little unpredictable there was a happy atmosphere throughout the Town.

St Ives held an outstanding Heritage Open Day on Saturday, 13th September, coinciding with the Old Riverport Jazz & Blues Festival. Both events attracting many visitors. The St Leger Chapel on St Ives Bridge welcomed a record number of 360 guests, while the Norris Museum greeted 176 visitors - twice as many as a typical Saturday. Holt Island had an exceptional number of 196 visitors and received numerous positive remarks from them. The Town Hall, Masonic Hall, Methodist Church, Free Church, Parish Church, Prayer & Education Centre and Sacred Heart Church were all busy greeting guests. Town Councillors, building guides and volunteers took pleasure in talking about some of our wonderful



old buildings and discussing their history. Civic Society team members wearing bright pink HOD sashes handed out leaflets and welcomed visitors around the town centre on this annual celebration of the nation's history and culture. Meanwhile all 27 concerts of the Jazz & Blues Festival, which began

on Thursday evening and ran until 9pm Sunday evening, were packed with music lovers. The Saturday footfall figures showed nearly 21,000 people were in town, slightly less than the number that came for the 600 Celebrations in July. Such events are vital to the economy as all businesses benefit from the extra visitors, many stay locally for the whole Festival.



Poppyman dies aged 101

Ed Kelly, well known for his service to the Royal British Legion and leading the annual Remembrance Day Parade died on 6th September aged 101. Ed was recently awarded the Freedom of the Town (See Riverporter 191) and last March received an MBE from His Majesty King Charles III at Windsor Castle, 70 years after being awarded the Airforce Medal from Queen Elizabeth II (Riverporter 181).



His modesty led him to say: 'I do talks about why you should wear a poppy and wear it with pride and say the heroes are the ones on the memorial. I'm one of the lucky ones who survived'.

His funeral, which will mostly be a family affair, will take place at St Ives Parish Church on Monday 13th October at 1pm. We believe there may be a memorial service for the town to celebrate Ed's life at a later date.

Stewart Denham funeral announced

We announced the death of Stewart Denham in our last issue but accidentally put the wrong date. Stewart died the same day as Ed Kelly on Saturday 6th September. Stewart was born in Boston, Lincolnshire in 1940 and qualified as an architect before changing in mid-life to take up graphic design, which was his love! He and his wife Elizabeth came to St Ives in 1970 where he became an active member of the Free Church, helping behind the scenes especially with publicity and displays. Stewart's funeral will be held in the Free Church on Tuesday 7th October at 2.45pm.

St Ivo Head to leave in December

he principal at St Ivo school, Tony Meneaugh, has surprised many by deciding to leave the post at the end of this autumn term. He was appointed in September 2023 (see RP139) when the school was receiving many complaints.

During his time leading the school, he has secured a 'good' Ofsted rating, the 'best ever' GCSE results and overseen a state-of-the-art Sixth Form facility.

In a letter to parents he thanked the school community for their support and outlined he had decided to leave St Ivo at a time when it is 'in a very positive place'.

Tony said:

'I have thoroughly enjoyed the challenges and opportunities at St Ivo over the past few years. Although I will miss my amazing staff team, students and their families, I am proud to be leaving the school in a really positive place.

'For me, leadership has always been

about getting the best out for our students. I strongly believe that a good education is the passport to a brilliant future, and giving students the opportunity to be their very best is the most important part of education.

Describing Mr Meneaugh as a 'dedicated leader', Rowena Hackwood, Chief Executive Officer of Astrea Academy Trust, said: 'On behalf of everyone at St Ivo, I would like to thank Tony for all the improvements he has made, from securing the school's 'Good' Ofsted, the fantastic GCSE results and a brand new Sixth Form centre for the young people of the community.

Tony has led St Ivo through so many

positive changes over the last two academic

years, and we wish him lots of success in the future."

The Riverporter asked Mr Meneaugh about his future. He said he hadn't yet decided what to do.'I might just go travelling for a while' he told us. He also said that the Sixth Form intake this year had 74 pupils, above the target for 50 students that had been set and had 111 pupils in total. The recruitment of a new leader for St Ivo will now begin, with a view to the new principal being in post for the start of the spring term in January 2026.

Majestic and calm. A curlew feeds silently just in front and avocets sweep their way through the silt. Here and there, hares box one another and deers

quietly graze, knee deep in fresh water. A fabulous place. I take a deep breath, close my eyes and open my arms as wide as can be. My happy place by the sea.

Major concern over sluice gates

the good people at Jones Boatyard have again raised the failure of the EA to repair the sluice gates. Their latest online report is very worrying on many fronts and has seen lots of comments urging our MP to help get the EA to do something.

Only 1 of the original 7 sluice gates at St Ives appear to now be functioning. That's just 14% of the designed capacity of the staunch.



The latest failure means:

- Six gates have now failed one after another – and nothing meaningful has been done to stop the collapse.
- The last remaining gate, never designed to carry the full flow alone, is now under stress. To put this in context:
- In 2024, the EA flood modelling was based on 4 working gates (57%).
- Later that year it dropped to 3 (42%), then recently 2 (28%).
- Now, we're down to 1 of 7. That's just 14%. It had three times that capacity during the floods of 2024.

If this final gate fails or simply needs to be closed for safety the Great Ouse will effectively be dammed at St Ives, with only minimal

ability to discharge downstream from overtopping the gates.

Both St Ives and Brownshill have been operating at significantly reduced flow capacity for some time. We believe both restrictions must be addressed to allow the river to drain naturally during periods of heavy rainfall.

Repairing one site while leaving a major downstream constraint in place would be illogical, as it would only shift the problem further along the system.

Despite EA assurances in September 2024 that 'moderation repairs' would begin within 9 months, no work has happened to address the decline.

To be clear:

- The EA officially claims this structure provides 'no significant flood protection.'
- Yet its own guidance on watercourse management says: 'You must let water flow naturally... or you may have to pay damages if you do not remove blockages that reduce flow or cause flooding to others' property."

We urge local representatives, councillors, MPs to step up pressure on the EA before the structure becomes beyond repair.








The Salt Path


