Are our traditions under threat?

Recently in a survey of 5,000 people, St Ives was ranked the 3rd happiest place to live in Cambridgeshire, behind Histon and Newnham. That might sound good. BUT third in Cambridgeshire! Come on! Surveys come and go and St Ives often features in the top three or even higher. They always mention the river and quaint buildings but as we residents know there is more to St Ives than that. We still have a welcoming community and fine traditions, but it isn't clear if they will survive today's society.

In July the Parish Church received a letter from a resident, who said that his wife had not had more than 15 minutes sleep since moving here owing to the bells. His letter said 'We are disappointed that the comfort of those who sleep soundly through the bells is considered more important than the well-being of those who are genuinely sleep-deprived by the nightly chiming. We appreciate the historical significance of the bells, but respectfully suggest that modern residential realities also deserve consideration'.



Subsequently a letter received from HDC's Environmental Health Officer informed the Church that they had received a complaint regarding noise from the Church Bells. Bells that have been chiming in the same way for over 100 years. The Officer explained that he was obliged to investigate the complaint, but he couldn't say who had complained. It's pretty common these days to complain or blame someone else for your discomfort but we are not sure that 'residential realities' have changed that much in 100 years. Presumably the thousands of residents who have lived in earshot of the bells over the past century managed to cope okay! Talking of coping - today we are told that one in five working adults are off work for a long time, due to stress and ill health. With today's 'mental health' epidemic we are a long way from the Dunkirk Spirit.

A festive concert with a difference

St Ives' All Saints Church is hosting **Bedford Gallery Quire**, which has for more than 20 years been dressing up and bringing back to life the occasionally irreverent quires of ordinary town and country folk who provided the music in churches during the 18th and 19th century. Such local groups preceded surpliced choirs and organs, which Victorian vicars could better control.

Each year, bags are distributed to Widows and Widowers who reside within the parish boundary and are listed on the electoral register. The 2026 distribution will be on **Wednesday 14th January** between 10am and 12 noon at St Ives Corn Exchange. The Town Council encourage eligible residents to attend to take part in this cherished local tradition.



The HAIGH Trust Draw


The Parade marches on at **10.30am** from Station Road (near Waitrose).
