Vote makes St Ivo happy

n Wednesday 35 District Councillors voted for Option E in the Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) debate, 7 voted for Option C and 7 abstained.

Public opinion, our MP and St Ivo himself, all urged councillors to choose that option, which could see Huntingdonshire becoming a Unitary Authority.

However with only our District voting for that option it is unlikely to become a reality.

As we reported in RP195 the County Council voted for Option A, Peterborough and Fenland chose Option D, which joins parts of North Huntingdonshire, including Huntingdon, with Peterborough and Fenland and with South Cambs, East Cambs and Cambridge City, most likely to endorse Option B, this leaves Huntingdonshire out on its own.

Briefly the process is this ...

Wednesday's decision will go to HDC's Cabinet, who will probably submit that as their preferred option to The Secretary of State for Local Government who will decide on the matter after receiving all the preferred options from Cambridgeshire (each authority can only choose one option).

How the government will determine which is the best option is unknown.

Why the reorganisation?

It has long been agreed that there are too many layers of local government and that it isn't sustainable.



Reducing them from three to two (Parish and Town Councils would remain) could allow greater efficiencies, better integration of services and an improved democratic process as most services become the responsibility of just one authority.

Add to this the likely savings then it makes sense to reorganise.

So what is wrong?

The whole process has frankly been a mess. From the outset the Government placed so many constraints on it that the best solutions have been excluded. The initial options agreed didn't suit all the districts and political gain became more important to some councillors.

Having lived in different parts of Huntingdonshire I know that the best solution is one that keeps communities together which already function rather than splitting them arbitrarily. One option, ruled out by the Government at the outset, which could be less disruptive and less expensive, would be for most of Cambridgeshire to become a unitary authority. Peterborough, which is already a unitary authority, could be expanded to include some of it's surrounding settlements that link to it socially and commercially, thereby creating two authorities of an appropriate size and less influenced by political gerrymandering.

This process has cost (wasted) £thousands, and by the time the new authorities are in place by May 2027 it will be £millions. Ultimately the decision rests in Downing Street, and it may have already been made, so all the talk and expense could be for nothing. I remain sceptical that the option chosen will be for the better. **Ed.**

Thicket Woodland Improvement Group Founded

An enthusiastic audience from St Ives, Houghton & Wyton and other local villages attended the founding meeting of TWIG, the **Thicket Woodland Improvement** Group, held at the St Mary's Centre in Houghton on October 29th to hear a presentation by Christine Phillpotts, Chair of the Civic Society on its current health and status. She recounted local concerns about the thinning of the wood, its reduced flora and fauna, HDCs maintenance programme being largely felling of trees with no replanting programme planned, which had led to discussions with H&W Parish Council, with HDC Parks & Countryside Team and a site walkabout with the arboricultural team who maintain the Thicket.

HDCs 2022 assessment of the Thicket found its soil health to be poor, unable to sustain large trees. and with little flora. Christine also found the Ancient Woodland Directory had declined to include the Thicket 30 years ago on the grounds it was largely scrub. As the Parks & Countryside Team didn't provide volunteers to maintain it as a green space, it was time to form a volunteer group to help make it the best it can be! TWIG now has an allocated Ranger to design & oversee a work programme for the working party, 4 volunteers sharing the coordination of the working party, fundraising & publicity plus a few hardy volunteers waiting beside their gumboots and trowels ready

to get stuck in - but we need more!

It is intended to undertake an ecological survey to create a baseline understanding of its eco-systems from which to draw up a suitable programme of work to help conserve the Thicket for future generations to enjoy. 

Ref: A response to the gentleman concerned that the new working party would damage The Thicket

I note your concern about what you

perceive as an inappropriate planting project, so let me assure you that the new group, TWIG, evolved out of perceptions raised by residents to the Civic Society during the Neighbourhood Plan consultation in 2002-3. It was noted that the Thicket had deteriorated and was not regenerating strongly enough to sustain itself. There are many valued volunteer groups tending to Huntingdon's green spaces but none work in the Thicket. HDCs priorities are largely limited to felling and pollarding old and diseased trees. There is no replanting programme so discussions with district & parish councillors, HDCs Parks and Countryside Team and Volunteer Coordinators supported the creation of a volunteer group under the guidance of a Ranger to remove litter and invasive species to encourage natural regrowth. (see article page 2). Without some TLC the woodland will eventually dwindle to nothing. It is worth more than that!

Winter Fuel Payments are made automatically, you do not need to do anything. If you receive any text messages about Winter Fuel Payments, it's a scam. Not sure if a message is real? Contact the organisation directly using the contact details on their official website, not the number or web address in the message. Your bank (or any other official source) won't ask you to supply personal information by email or text message.

Have you Looked at your water bill recently?

A visit by Natalie Leigh-Brown to talk at November's Eco Café taught us a lot and made us realise there is more to saving water than just not running the tap while cleaning our teeth.

The effects of Climate Change have accelerated faster than expected and water companies are starting to lay pipes to pump water to us from Lincolnshire, but still we use an average of 136 litres per person per day at home which we could probably cut to 90 litres without too much effort – reducing our bills in the process. We thought this would just be a talk about water, but had never thought of the energy

involved in moving water around; it is extremely heavy (pick up a full bucket and see) and takes 3% of the energy used in the UK to pump it around, as well as energy to clean it. Why hasn't anyone told us before? We hadn't realised that the Eco Button on washing machines does actually reduce the energy used even though the cycle takes longer; think of hard accelerating in a car against doing so gently.

Of course, there's an eco button on dishwashers, too, and using the little button on the toilet flush halves the amount of water used. We realised that we really can do a lot to cut our water bills and to reduce

the energy needed to supply us. Thank you, Natalie, for a brilliant talk!
