Rangers seek volunteers to save tournament

St Ives Rangers FC has issued an urgent call for volunteers to help ensure its popular Summer Tournament goes ahead this year. The two-day tournament, held at One Leisure Outdoor and scheduled for 13–14 June, is a major highlight in the club's

calendar, attracting young players, families and visiting teams from across the region. However, organisers say the event is now at risk unless more off-the-pitch support is secured in the coming weeks.

The club is appealing to locals who

can help with planning and administration in the lead-up to the tournament, rather than just on the weekend itself. Roles include team registration, recruiting and organising volunteers, updating the club website, and assisting with other administrative tasks.

Chairman Ed Goodman said the situation was critical but he remained hopeful the community would step up: 'We're asking anyone with the right skills to get involved.' He added that even a small amount of time could make a big difference.

Could monster logistics park affect St Ives?

Plans for a Logistics Park, near the Spittals roundabout in Huntingdon (see below), has raised concern by residents because of the size of some of the warehouses, which could be up to 24 metres tall.

District Councillors are due to meet on Monday to decide whether the development can go ahead.

Developer, Newlands Property Developments (Huntingdon) Ltd, wants to create up to 205,000 sqm of storage and distribution space, and a bus depot.

Plans state the maximum building heights (18.5m to 24m), reflect

market demand and respond to the 'surrounding landscape context', while accommodating modern standards for storage facilities.

A new access road is proposed to be created off the A141 and the developer has said it hopes to start work on the site in 2026 and complete in 2033.

It would be surprising if the objection to the development, based on it being an eyesore, is successful as this site, next to a commercial development and Huntingdon Racecourse, is hardly a beauty spot.

For a distribution centre this location is good as large vehicles can access the A1 and A14 easily. So why it could affect St Ives?

The size of this project would see a lot of vehicles coming and going throughout the day and possibly through the night.

Should either the A1 or A14 be blocked (as often happens), then large lorries could be re-routed through St Ives to go Eastwards. And we all know what effect that could have for St Ives.

Shouldn't alternative routing be considered in advance of approval?

We expect Trio Plus to be one of the most exciting bands at this year's Festival as it features guitarist Keith Winters (below) of Shakatak fame. Shakatak are an English jazz-funk band founded in 1980. An initial white label release, 'Steppin', caught attention by Passion records owner Les McCutcheon and Northern Soul DJ Kev Roberts. They chose the band's name derived from a Soho record store called 'Record Shack'. They scored a number of chart entries, including two Top 10 hits in the UK Singles Chart plus a further 12 entries in the Guinness Book of British Hit Singles.

The group is still active and popular throughout the world, particularly in Japan and the Far East, and generally produce a new album every two years on JVC Records. Trio Plus features Keith Winters on guitar, Martin Hallmark on piano, Alan Carruthers (of Spiral G's) on bass, Stuart Pringle on drums and our very own Festival favourite, Myke Clifford, on Sax and flute.

Did you know that St Ives had an ADHD + Autistic Neurodiversity group? The group which meets regularly at the River Terrace Café was formed last year by Kevin Bryant and Sarah Bateman and has grown to around 90 members, ranging from 19 to 86 years old. Around 1% of the population are Autistic and 5-6% have ADHD meaning that there are probably 1,400 people in St Ives who are neurodivergent.

Town Council fund local groups

St Ives Town Council had a difficult task in choosing which community groups to support as there was only £35,270 allocated for grants after funds for the Norris museum were committed.

The grant for the Museum is historic and one where the Town Council is acting in its role as Sole Trustee of the Charity.

They have a duty to support the museum and the money is reducing each year. Last year the Norris museum received £33,000, which must be used for running costs for the museum - not for salaries.

The total requested by organisations from the Council amounted to £96,543, so some groups were unable to be supported.

In the end councillors agreed the following grants:

Citizens Advice Rural Cambs	wasn't awarded a grant but free space at the Burleigh Hill Community Centre would continue to be available.
Requests for funding from Hemingford Fireworks, the Free Church and St Ives Hockey Club	were all declined.


Have your say on reorganisation

Public consultation has opened on Cambridgeshire reorganisation and Cllr Bulat would like you to back Option E (a Huntingdonshire-only authority). Consultation ends on 26th March. The County Council have increased their portion of the Council Tax by 4.99% up £84.78 on a band D. Meanwhile St Ives Town Council have increased their share of the Precept by 9% (up £16.38) making a band D property about £202, which is £19 more than St Neots and £84 more than Ramsey, but £84 less than Huntingdon.



Lee tells the story of American photographer and war correspondent Lee Miller (Kate Winslet), who was determined to document the truth of the Nazi regime during World War II. Defying expectations for women at the time, she travelled to the front lines for Vogue magazine, capturing some of the most significant and horrific images of the war, including the liberation of the Dachau concentration camp. The film, a passion project for star Kate Winslet, explores her journey from a celebrated fashion model to a fearless photojournalist and the immense personal trauma she endured from what she witnessed. The narrative is framed by a later-life interview as Miller grapples with her past and the price of bearing witness to history's atrocities.

**The Choral**

The Choral is set in a fictional Yorkshire town in 1916. The Choral follows a local choral society depleted by men leaving to fight in World War I. The ambitious committee hires the demanding Dr. Henry Guthrie (Ralph Fiennes) as the new chorus master. Despite suspicions about his time in Germany, Guthrie recruits local teenagers to fill the ranks. The group prepares for a performance of Elgar's The Dream of Gerontius, chosen because it wasn't composed by a German. The film explores themes of community, resilience, and the power of music as the young men face impending conscription and the community grapples with wartime loss.
